From The Desk of Patrick Collins, Interim Priest

By the time you read this, we will have welcomed these individuals into the Great Cloud of Witnesses also known as the Communion of Saints. We get to worship and minister here because of the faithfulness of those who have come before us. These beloved souls were also baptized in the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Third Quarter Financial Report – September 30, 2024

As we move into the final months of the year, please consider any final year end contribution to our church. For our senior parishioners it might be best to make any final charitable donations directly from their IRA accounts as a Qualified Charitable Donation if that is their best option after discussing with their tax advisor. Also, besides a cash contribution, it might be best to transfer a highly appreciated stock in your portfolio. In turn you get the write-off at its fair market value. Again, it is best to discuss this with your tax advisor. Just offering a few ideas besides sending a check. All contributions are appreciated, and we "Thank You".

Below I have recapped our financial position and have also provided a summary page of our income and expenses through the nine months ended September 30, 2024.

- Pledges and Offerings were \$508,161 versus the prior year at \$601,074, a decrease of \$92,913. Vestry will continue to monitor our financial position. We are hopeful that our Fall stewardship campaign will inspire an increase in parishioner donations for our programs and services for 2025.
- Education expenses were budgeted at a higher amount this year versus prior year to better serve our youth.
- Buildings and grounds continue to be less than last year as well as below the budgeted amount. Current year expenses are \$116,648 while prior year was \$124,182. The annual budgeted amount is \$176,162.
- With all the staff changes from last year, our Salaries and Benefits Expense was \$362,260 versus last year at \$501,690. The annual budgeted amount is \$649,936. We will be well below that number.
- The deficit position to date is \$132,852 while last year there was a deficit of \$79,033. The budgeted deficit amount for 2024 is \$293,763. Our deficit will be better than projected.
- Investment and Endowment returns continue to be favorable to date with an increase of \$644,305. Our Unrestricted Endowment accounts on September 30, 2024, were \$4,623,564 and the Restricted Endowment accounts were \$1,607,694.

We continue to "thank you" for your support to Christ Church and making this our church to worship, pray and to be inspired. The Vestry continues to closely monitor our financial position for the best interests of the church. We are blessed to have a strong Endowment position that has supplemented our deficit position and allows the continued services and programs that we provide. The Vestry understands we cannot continue to operate in a deficit position continually. We have a beautiful Church and it's a pleasure to call this Church our home.

Projects and Progress

I am happy to report that the Sussex Environmental Consulting Group has found that there is no mold in the damaged tiles in the Children's Chapel. The stains are caused by water, probably from the air ducts when the air conditioner was running. We did expensive repairs last summer to the air conditioning system in the upper parish hall ceiling, so hopefully everything is fine now. I am in touch with a local handyman who will be by next week to assess and fix the damage; fortunately, I have located some replacement ceiling tiles in the storeroom which might by usable. I can also report that the rotted wood from the window dormer above the Children's Chapel has bee repaired, re-caulked, and repainted.

For one of the final times in Easton, worked with Choptank Habitat for Humanity. We are nearly done with the dozen houses slated to be built in Easton. Soon we will be moving on to Cambridge for future projects.

Once again we want to remind all users of the upper Parish Hall to please turn off the lights by pressing the buttons; the dimmers do not turn off the lights completely and we waste electricity. We have labeled the light switches to remind people.


We think it was worth the wait: The Parish Library now sparkles with its new carpet (thank you, Shelley) and its refurbished wooden floor, courtesy of Pat Schultz. Pat pointed out to me that the oak floor has walnut plugs in it, which is how floors were installed before nails became more commonplace. I also want to thank Zeke and Nick of the recovery house for coming over and replacing the furniture in the library and hallway.

Thanks to our friends at ShoreRivers and McHale Landscaping, we now have a new, beautiful American hornbeam tree planted in our back courtyard. This specimen will grow to about twenty or thirty feet; it is also called ironwood or musclewood for the look and feel of its smooth bark. Our neighbor Maribeth Lane has offered to water it for us, as her hose can reach the tree easily. ShoreRivers promise to return in the spring to attach a water bag. This tree was planted as part of ShoreRiver's "Tree the Shore" initiative: https://www.shorerivers.org/tree-the-shore. We did not have to pay a dime for this wonderful addition.

Speaking of garden beautification efforts, many thanks to Laurie Mackaness who ran out and purchased the mums for our Rectory plot. The Lay Weeders, led by John Thacker, spend a couple of hours last Saturday deadheading flowers, raking out the garden bed near the back sign, and planting these mums. John has also written a grant application to the Easton Garden Club, applying for \$4,000 to improve the garden right in front of the Rectory. We will only learn if we are successful in the spring.

As the seasons change, we wish to thank Chip Akridge for suggesting that we keep the Mission window of our church lit day and night. As Chip puts it, "Part of the thinking on the initial making and installing of the stained glass window was to have the window in our parish shine the light of Christ on our community!! " Anyone who has been downtown for a recent nighttime festival can attest to how bright the window shines; it is becoming synonymous with downtown Easton. As we enjoy the Waterfowl festival, Advent, Christmas, and the Epiphany, we can take comfort in seeing the light shining bright. May God bless us all.

Last year's Advent Lessons & Carols concert with the combined Christ Church Easton and Trinity Cathedral choirs was filled to capacity. And it was a powerful and moving way to begin the Advent season.

This year, on Sunday, December 1 at 5:00pm, on the first day of Advent, the two choirs will come together again for another incredible show under the direction of choir directors Carolyn Parsons Cutler and Carleen Dixon Webb.

This year's concert will also be broadcast live on our Facebook page and YouTube channel.



With all of the clamoring for Christmas, we get cheated out of Advent. That short-changes the beginning of the new church year. And how much lesser is Christmas without the hopeful waiting of Advent?

We're going to try to be a bit more intentional with our December this year. We'll have small group studies and I will be writing and reflecting from Rev. Tish Harrison Warren's book, "Advent: The Season of Hope."

Sessions will be scheduled for Tuesdays at 1:00pm and 6:00pm, beginning on November 26, and on Wednesdays at 11:00am, beginning on November 27. The groups will meet once a week for four weeks.

I'm excited to spend an intentional and anticipatory Advent together, with what practices, prayers, and discussions we will share. Here are a few words from Harrison in the book's first chapter:

"We begin our Christian year in waiting. We do not begin with our own frenetic effort or energy. We do not begin with the merriment of Christmas or the triumph of Easter. We do not begin with the work of the church or the mandate of the Great Commission. Instead, we begin in a place of yearning. We wait for our King to come."

Since Father Bill announced his retirement last June, there has been a great deal of work being done behind the scenes, including the interim search and finding Patrick. The Search Committee met for the first time in October and has established a twice-a-month meeting schedule.

The Rector Search Committee has been busy focused on moving the search process forward.

The Committee's mission/purpose is to: Provide oversite, share guidance, develop, and implement processes for the recruitment, identification, assessment, selection, and onboarding of a new Rector for Christ Church.

We will fulfill this mission through the work being done in the five phases of the search:

Congregational Discovery
Solicitation of Interest/Calling
Assessment of Candidates
Vestry Selection
On Boarding

Currently in the Congregational Discovery phase, we want to hear from you! We are reviewing a survey tool that will assist us in gathering information from each of you.

Once we have selected the tool and process, we will share with you – stay tuned!!

Be on the lookout for regular communications about the search during services, Friday e-News,, Church Bulletin and the Crossroads monthly newsletter. We are also working on a landing page for the search that can be used for both the congregation and interested candidates.

We are confident our next rector is out there and together with your help, we will have a new rector to lead us in continuing the good work that Christ Church is known for.
